#### **UPDATES**

#### WISS INITIATIVE

Teachers in the province have been thrown into the deep end with online teaching. WISS is no exception. We are fully aware that teaching online is in some very important respects not like classroom teaching. But it's sink or swim for teachers! #### **SURVEY RESULTS: STUDENTS**

- Generally quite satisfied with the online model: can pay attention, have enough time to do homework and assignments, can work independently, can find resources, like the way teachers teach.
- Only somewhat satisfied with teacher resources used in the class.
- Like the daily contact with teachers but it's not easy to interact.
- Not enough students understand the homework or assignments.
- Most find it hard to pay attention for the entire class and far too many get distracted.
- Can't get as much work done online as in the classroom.
- Some favour trying a different model.
- Strong agreement that technology prevents them from learning well.

#### What are the implications for teaching going forward?

- 1. The low level of satisfaction with teacher-student interaction echoes teachers' comments. Exercise caution with assessment data for conversations.
- 2. Technology for teachers and students is less than adequate.
- 3. Take more time to explain homework and assignments to ensure good understanding of tasks.
- 4. Keep on the slow and steady path with lessons.
- 5. Teaching strategies/resources need attention.
